Safety

Asbestos testing of destroyed and fire damaged houses has been completed. Please contact your local council for results.

Safety precautions

If you must enter structures which contain damaged asbestos materials, you should wear appropriate personal protective equipment such as P2 face masks, disposable suits and boots which can be washed down.

Avoid creating dust and follow good hygiene procedures. Don't take dusty shoes or clothes away from the site as this may take asbestos fibres into your vehicles and accommodation, potentially exposing you and your family.

Remember, if there was asbestos present there may be contamination of the ground around the building and downwind of the remaining materials.

If asbestos is present or suspected, please DO NOT attempt to clean up yourself but deal directly with your insurer.

Cleaning up your property

Disposing of dangerous chemicals

To dispose of chemical waste safely, please call the ChemClear hotline on 1800 008 182 or visit <u>www.chemclear.com.au</u>

To dispose of chemical containers, call drumMUSTER on 1800 008 707 to find your closest drum collection point.

Household waste (including asbestos waste)

You (or your nominated contractor/insurer responsible for clean-up) should contact your local council in the first instance for information about disposal procedures:

If you need further guidance, you can also contact the SafeWork NSW Asbestos and Demolition Unit on 13 10 50.

In most circumstances, including when buildings containing asbestos are destroyed by fire, asbestos removal must be undertaken by licensed contractors and waste disposed of appropriately at accredited landfill sites.

Burial of burnt materials

All waste needs to be disposed of at landfills that can lawfully receive the waste, unless onsite burial is specifically permitted.

On-farm burial of burnt materials is generally not permitted unless you have approval from Council.

Approval must be sought from Council for onsite burial of any waste.

Please do not bury burnt materials on your farm as this action may cause the site to be classified as contaminated land.

This contaminated land tag may remain with your property until the buried material is removed and the site remediated.

If your farming practices are noted as organic, a label of contaminated land is highly likely to jeopardise your organic certification status.

Burial of asbestos materials (burnt or not) onsite is highly discouraged and may be illegal. The best place for asbestos to be disposed is in an approved landfill where there is no risk of future disturbance or exposure. When you are ready to rebuild, it is likely that development consent in the form of a Development Application will be needed. Council is required to ensure the site is free of contamination that may present a risk to people, property or the environment before any consent can be granted.

Risks associated with burnt materials

If you need to access buildings which have been destroyed by fires, be aware of risks associated with burnt materials. Burnt plastic and treated pine timber release dangerous fumes and create contaminated ash.

One of the main risks is burnt asbestos cement sheeting which in many cases becomes friable. This means it can be crushed easily and become airborne.

Help is available with fencing and materials

Livestock assistance

Local Land Services (LLS) is still available to help you with ongoing livestock issues.

While they have scaled back their on-ground staff numbers and closed the Forward Command Posts at Merriwa and Dunedoo, there are LLS offices in Coonabarabran, Dubbo, Mudgee and Merriwa, and plenty of District Veterinarians and Biosecurity Officers spread around the area.

It is anticipated that some animals that have been through the fire and are being cared for on farm will take weeks, if not months, to recover. Please keep in touch with your veterinarian during this period.

Counsellors can also provide clients with immediate support in terms of understanding their financial position, liaising with banks to review or renegotiate loans, developing recovery cash flow budgets and referring clients to other essential service providers.
