Warrumbungle shouldn't be charging curb an gutting especially with the price of rates.

Property owners will no longer be charged for new kerb and guttering, or a new footpath, constructed adjacent to private property as part of planned works, due to a resolution passed by Central Coast Council on July 9.

Under the Roads Act 1993, Council can recover up to half the cost of constructing footpath paving and kerb and guttering. Central Coast Mayor, Jane Smith, said Council was prepared to cover the full cost of kerb and guttering and footpath construction required as part of planned projects.

“Removing the possibility of being charged when new kerb and guttering or a new footpath is installed in front of your property will be welcome news for our rate payers,” Mayor Smith said.

“New kerb and guttering and a new footpath adjacent to a private property could cost a rate payer \$1,500 on average,” she said.

“Council will now cover this cost if the work is part of a planned project.” The change was back-dated to July 1, 2018.


Dear Sir,

Capital Projects P 34 Bowen Oval Equipment Storage lists as 100% funded but no amount noted in the year(s) yet this was to be funded under LRCI-phase 3 (Funds available Feb 2022) if the Bowen Oval netball courts were successfully funded from another grant source which happened.

The Bowen Oval Steering Committee did the consultation with user groups, plans and costings (all the leg work), Council has all the information from the Bowen Oval Steering committee which also noted potential increase in metal prices. I had a conversation with Mayor on this project assuring me if netball courts funded via another source Equipment storage would jump up to its place. Written Submission: • Community Development (Coordinator omission) Needs to clearly stipulate budget is for Community Development Coordinators (Pg 15 OP)

- Accommodate the CDDG storage requirements when doing the disabled toilet development(pg 34 DP)

- Inadequate funding for Town Signage project (pg 46DP) – six towns and multiple entrances. Suggest review of budget eg. Coolah has four entrances, Dunedoo has 3, Mendooran has 3, Coona has 5. Could be a requirement of 24 signs. \$7000 is not enough for signage design and consultation, construction and installation

- Concerns around the allocation of funds for the Sewage Treatment Plant Upgrade (pg 65DP) and Replacement of Martin Street Reservoir (pg 67DP). If this from external grant funding or rate payer revenue? EG. Streets for shared spaces noted that it is grant funded

- Why is the Streets for Shared Spaces funding included in the budget when it is external funding. (pg 35 DP) EG. Are all other external grants displayed in budget, eg Jump the Stump etc?

- Annual Donations – re churches, schools, halls. Consider automatic to those charities. Possibility of simplifying the process, rather than them having to apply annually. Huge demand on already exhausted volunteers.

- Annual Donations list of recipients Page 22 of Revenue Policy, fees and charges. With this list – apparently we should have put in for Coolah Swimming club – Coona received \$500

o Schools – whole LGA 11 schools ??\$770?? That’s weird – WHY NOT churches, halls under same banner?

o Coolah Landcare \$1,000 – submitted to cover Council mowing etc.

People are missing out on lot of help because poor understanding of Annual Donations/Donations. WHY does this have to be so much of a hassle? Every one of these organisations is working for the community, working to make up gaps in what Council can afford to deliver, all volunteers. Names and process need to be reviewed and with community consultation. Make them clear, concise and simple. Annual Donations and Financial Assistance Donations are always confused by those that only hear about them once a year.

Written Submission: The Goolhi Hall has long been the meeting place for the Goolhi and district community. The Hall was originally funded post World II by the local community but it has been managed by the Warrumbungle Shire for many years with the local community fund raising for items such a fridge, stove, BBQ, air-conditioning and dishwasher.

Last year the Hall had its doors replaced, including the locks, the tank was patched but once again does not hold water and some other minor repairs where completed. This was the first lot of maintenance funds received from the Warrumbungle Shire for a very long time.

The Hall is regularly used by the Goolhi CWA, volunteer fire brigade, ANZAC Day service, Christmas Service, it is also regularly used during times of disaster, fire. drought and flooding, a place to meet, train and celebrate.

As a community we are are now asking the Shire to invest back into the Hall to ensure it is a safe and welcoming meeting place for the community.

*The Hall needs re-stumping, particularly in the store room area - we are currently trying to get quotes for this. This is a critical repair as it impacting the stability of the building and is impacting the roof as stumps fail. circa \$50K

*The floors need to be sanded and sealed - children can not currently crawl or walk without shoes due to splinters - Can't be done till the stumping has been done

*The Hall and toilet block needs painting (I note Baradine estimate in the budget is cost \$50K for their Hall so we would be at least the same)

*The Hall's tank requires replacing as does the pump to get the water into the Hall with new roadbase. - \$7,730 Two tanks 7 one pump, as during the drought locals relied on the Hall water for drinking water. quote from Rapidplas Tamworth

*Goolhi used to boast 8 clay tennis courts. For years we tried to get support to be able to maintain at least two of the courts for the community - we would like support to have these courts sealed or artificially turfed so they can be used by the community. In the short term these courts need to be sprayed, scrapped with a leveler and the fence securing the courts from wild life and cattle being moved from property to property to be repaired.
